EVERY DAY COUNTS: THE VALUE OF CONSISTENT ATTENDANCE

Academic Growth Depends on Attendance

Ākonga who attend school regularly are more likely to stay on top of their learning. Consistent attendance helps tamariki develop key skills in reading, writing, and maths. Even missing a few days can cause gaps in learning, making it harder for them to catch up.

Supporting Positive Behavior and Social Skills

When tamariki attend kura regularly, they learn important social skills, like teamwork, problem-solving, and communication. It also helps ākonga build routines, resilience, and friendships that support their emotional and behavioural development.

What the Ministry of Education Says

The Ministry of Education highlights that regular attendance (90% or more) is critical for ensuring ākonga have the best chance at success. Ākonga who attend regularly are more likely to achieve their learning goals and stay engaged in school life, opening doors for future opportunities.

Working Together for Success

Quick Facts about Attendance

1. Just two days a month matter: Missing just two days of school a month adds up to 20 days a year that's a whole month of learning missed!

2. Early habits make a big difference:

Tamariki who develop strong attendance patterns in their early years are more likely to continue these habits through secondary school.

3. Attendance builds confidence:

When ākonga are in school regularly, they feel more confident in their learning and build strong connections with their peers and kaiako.

NATIONAL CURRICULUM UPDATE : TE MĀTAIAHO

Te Mātaiaho is the new name for the refreshed New Zealand Curriculum. This refresh aims to make learning more engaging, relevant, and inclusive for all students.

A recent development, which you may be familiar with is the acceleration of two curricula areas implementation, namely, Maths and English. This significant change will not only enhance the quality of education your children receive but also align our school's strategic direction with the latest educational research and best practices.

The new curriculum will be introduced a year earlier than originally planned, ensuring that our students benefit from a knowledge-rich approach to mathematics and pāngarau from the start of 2025. This means that your children will have access to engaging and relevant learning experiences that will equip them with the skills they need to succeed in the future.

As we thoughtfully plan and consider the successful and sustainable implementation of this curricula, one key priority will be to support our teachers in implementing this new curriculum effectively. This will mean providing professional learning and development opportunities, including dedicated maths teacher only days. These sessions will ensure that our

Key Changes:

The curriculum will prioritise student achievement and look to accelerate and celebrate progress. Additionally, the curriculum will clearly outline what students need to know and be able to do. All ākonga will have the opportunity to see themselves reflected in the curriculum and kaiako will receive resources and support to help them implement the new curriculum.

What is the Intended Effect for my Child?

The rationale and purpose of the redesign is to ensure that all ākonga will have the opportunity to experience more interactive and relevant learning activities. Teachers will have a more detailed and structured scope and sequence, allowing greater tailoring of their instruction to meet your child's individual needs. There has The new curriculum will provide a solid foundation for your child's future learning and success. educators are well-prepared to deliver high-quality instruction and support your children's learning. In addition to the curriculum refresh, we are continuing with a minimum of twice-yearly assessments to monitor student progress and identify areas where additional support may be needed. These assessments will provide valuable data that will inform our teaching practices and ensure that all students have the opportunity to reach their full potential.

Our school's strategic direction and professional learning priorities will be aligned with the goals of the curriculum refresh, prioritising the needs of our ākonga in the prioritisation and rolling out of these. We are committed to providing your children with a world-class education, and will continue to communicate our progress around these areas.

2025 CALENDAR

As we look ahead to the upcoming academic year, we are excited to share our plans for balancing various initiatives to enhance our school's curriculum and overall experience. Some notable mentions regarding the structure of next year is outlined below, including an update on teacher-only days for the curriculum refresh which have been allocated since previously communicating this calendar.

• To ensure our kaiako are well-prepared to design and implement learning programs that align with the curriculum refresh, we will strategically utilise the two dedicated teacher-only days allocated by the Ministry of Education. These days will likely be scheduled in Term 1 and Term 3, ensuring a balanced approach that accounts for other teacher only days and public holidays throughout the year.

We're currently looking to coordinate the opportunity to connect staff from across Elim kura and will communicate these dates prior to the end of Term 4, 2024.

- Our commitment to Christian pedagogy will influence our academic calendar. Term 2 will conclude on a Thursday to allow for spiritual reflection and renewal.
- To honour the mahi of our ākonga throughout each term, we are implementing several refinements. These include a 2pm finish at the end of each term and a 12pm finish on the last day of the year.
- Building upon our established processes, we will be working closely with our Elim counterparts to achieve greater alignment with professional learning and networking which will result in starting earlier than our current year, on January 31st.

Please note that while our current calendar may not reflect all community events, we are actively planning for a variety of activities throughout the year. We are also partnering with the ARISE parents committee to explore fundraising opportunities that bring our whānau together.

We understand the importance of providing ample notice for your planning. Therefore, we will always communicate upcoming events ahead of the upcoming term.

We are confident that these initiatives will contribute to a positive and enriching learning environment for your children. Thank you for your continued support and partnership.

TERM 4 UNIFORM GUIDELINES: TRANSITION TO SUMMER UNIFORMS

As we move into the warmer summer months, it's time for our ākonga to transition from winter uniforms to summer uniforms for Term 4. To ensure all our students are comfortable and appropriately dressed for the season, we would like to remind parents and caregivers of the updated uniform expectations.

The summer uniform helps keep our tamariki cool while maintaining a tidy and consistent appearance that reflects the values of our school. Below are the key guidelines for Term 4:

- Hats: All children **MUST** wear an Elim school hat when outside during playtimes, including during PE lessons. This is essential for sun protection, especially with the stronger summer sun.
- Shirts: Children are to wear the Elim logo royal blue polo shirt. Please note that no visible t-shirts or undergarments should be worn under the polo shirt to keep the uniform looking neat and in line with our school standards.
- **Girls' Uniform**: Girls are expected to wear the **black Elim skorts**. **Tracksuit pants** or other winter wear are **not** allowed during Term 4, as they are no longer necessary with the warmer weather.
- Boys' Uniform: Boys should wear the black Elim shorts. As with the girls, trousers or tracksuit pants are not permitted during Term 4.
- Socks and Shoes: All students must wear plain black socks and shoes, with no visible trim or additional colours allowed. This ensures that all children maintain a unified and tidy look.

Additionally, we kindly remind you to **label all clothing items clearly** to help us return any lost items to their rightful owners.
